Though the book has a police officer as its central character, the author mentions, "The book is not about police procedures. It is about the social perception of the Force." Gadekar says she feels very strongly about gender related crimes, a sad reality of our society. Here, she attempts to merge the genre of crime fiction with family drama. Revolving around ACP Juneja, who batpersonal his demons tles and dilemmas, the book places him in a remote village to solve the mystery of a road scam. From a favoured subordinate being investigated for rape charges, to drinking in the vicinity of the police stations, the book attempts to touch the realities of how at times things are.
